- · Send weekly emails to staff updating them on the success of our chapters, councils, regions, and global communities.
- Help create open dialogues between R/C Godolim and their advisors in order to establish the most productive relationships.
- Meet with R/C staff on my visits to set goals, assess their communities, and understand the chapters in their region from an adult perspective.

#### The Visit

The purpose of a visit from the GAG is to not only better understand our communities, but to invigorate them as well.

#### **Before**

- Make a checklist with the Godol of ten things that we need to accomplish while I am there.
- Schedule productive times to meet with the regional board, chapter Godolim, regional staff, and as many Alephs as possible.
- With the Godol, research organizations within the community that they can start or strengthen partnerships with.
- Work with 89th Grand Board to establish what info I need to get and give on my visits.
- Do research individually about the Jewish community and its history.

#### During

- · Visit with as many chapters as possible to capitalize on the amount of Alephs I connect with.
- · Amend previously established goals.
- · Work with Godolim to better assess how they can adapt the five teen priorities and other international initiatives to the needs of their R/C.
- Work with R/C boards to recognize issues within the chapters and set achievable goals in order to solve them.
- · Work with Godolim to energize the leadership within the R/C/Ch.
- · Kick back and bond with my brother Alephs.

#### After

- Check back with Regional and Council Godolim one month after the visits to ensure that the goals we set are being put into action.
- Highlight the successes of the Region or Council that I just visited to the International Order through social media and correspondence.
